COVID-19

The COVID pandemic continues to affect all our lives. After more than a year of having to conduct all our services on-line by Zoom, we were delighted to resume in-person services at Hawaiian Queen Coffee Garden in July. Because we feel responsible to protect our membership and visitors, we established these health practices following State and County rules and guidelines for our sacred spaces:

- All persons who enter the facility must be fully vaccinated and boosted against COVID-19.
- All attendees will wear appropriate masks when indoors.
- The maximum number of attendees will be determined by State and County guidelines at the time.
- We practice 6' social distancing.

RABBI DANIEL PRESSMAN



Rabbi Daniel Pressman was born and raised in Los Angeles, California. He was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. As a young rabbi, Daniel Pressman was especially passionate about Jews in the former Soviet Union who were being oppressed and not allowed to emigrate. Not only did he encourage congregants to take a stand, but he also was among the 27 rabbis arrested in 1985 for chaining themselves to the gates of the Soviet consulate in San Francisco.

He is the son of Rabbi Jacob Pressman, a founding father of Camp Ramah in California and of the Conservative movement's University of Judaism in Los Angeles (now American Jewish University).

Daniel Pressman came to the Bay Area with his wife, Beverly, and three children after spending seven years as a pulpit rabbi in Palos Verdes. His tenure at Beth David in Saratoga, where he served as senior rabbi for 33 years until his retirement in 2014, was marked by his emphasis on *chesed*, or lovingkindness. He strengthened support for traditional Jewish funeral practices, forming a *chevra kadisha* (burial society). Rabbi Pressman emphasized the participation of women and girls: He added the matriarchs to the Amidah prayer, and also urged many women, denied the opportunity to have a bat mitzvah as girls, to have an adult bat mitzvah. He also welcomed interfaith families.

He was known as a "rabbi's rabbi." KBS got to know him as a regular participant in our on-line Torah study sessions and has earned the respect and friendship of all our participants.

Rabbi Pressman has invited us to schedule some education classes while he is here between Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur. The dates will be announced by e-mail and on the KBS website.

RABBI SHARI JOY BERMAN



Former KBS President Shari Berman was ordained as Rabbi on June 18, 2022, while many of us watched on Zoom. Rabbi Shari returns again to Kona to join Rabbi Pressman in the role of rabbi and *chazzanit* for this year's High Holiday Services. Shari was president of Congregation Kona Beth Shalom from 2006 through 2012 when she moved to Japan to assume the role of Associate Professor at Hirosaki National University. In 2020, she became Special Associate Professor to the university's Graduate School of Medicine. Since relocating, she has returned to Kona several times to serve as officiant or cantorial soloist for the High Holidays as well as to lead Shabbat Services. She has been active with the Jewish Community of Japan (JCJ), participating as well as leading services online and in Tokyo and officiating at JCJ B'nei Mitzvah.

In addition, Shari has brought groups of Hirosaki University students to Kona to learn about health care, marine biology, agricultural science, etc., as they actively work on ideas to improve our lives both in Hawaii and in Aomori Prefecture. As president of KBS, Shari encouraged many of our members to study Torah and to learn Hebrew. She officiated more than a dozen B'nei Mitzvah here, including several after she moved back to Japan.

Shari was born in Chicago and moved with her family to Ashiya, Japan at the age of nine. The family later moved to Ohio. She studied Spanish, Italian and Japanese at Ohio State, graduating *summa cum laude* with distinction in Spanish for a thesis on Judío Español ("Ladino"). After working in Tokyo at Sony Language Laboratory for two years, she returned to the United States to earn her MAT (Master of

Arts in Teaching). After serving as an instructor at two University of California campuses she returned to Japan where she met her wife, Alice Bratton. They launched a language services business, Japan Language Forum, Ltd., in 1986 that still thrives today.

_____ **\$** ____ ANOTHER JEWISH YEAR LIKE NO OTHER, 5782

As these years of the pandemic continued, many of Kona Beth Shalom's activities continued to take place in the home of Aviva & Yehudah Plaut. They report that our Torah seems to remain happy and content living in their son Ben's room upstairs when not in active use.

One of the most enduring and successful KBS activities has been the Torah study of the weekly parasha, now in its third year. With 7-8 regular participants from all over the world, we have been joined by dropins including visiting rabbis. One rabbi who has attended regularly, Rabbi Daniel Pressman, is in fact our rabbi for High Holy Days services this year along with our own Shari Berman, who was ordained as rabbi this past June.

Each online Torah study session starts with a presentation of Art of the Torah gathered by Alan Silverman from all over the world. This "gallery tour" includes old masters as well as contemporary Jewish artists. Each parsha is read and discussed by all who want to add their thoughts. Historical commentary is added as well. As we described for the Annual Newsletter last year, the weekly invitation to our Torah study group has a link to the reading on the Sefaria web-site. Having completed the cycle the last two years, we are now immersed in our third cycle.

High Holy Days (2021)

Last year our High Holy Days services were conducted on-line via Zoom. The services were led from Japan by **Shari Berman**, along with **Rabbi Marc Labowitz** of Temple Adath Or in South Florida, who joined us with his family, also via Zoom. Again using an updated version of the Renewal *machzor* **B'Seifer Chayim** that **Rabbi Daniel Lev** introduced to us from the **Aquarian Minyan** in Berkeley, reassembled for Zoom usage with the help of **Alan Silverman** and revised by **Shari Berman**, we prepared, printed and mailed out copies to all our members and registrants in time for Rosh HaShana.

Besides the music repertoire of both video and high quality audio, including cantorial and song by **Shari Berman** and **Daniele Gold** with instrumental accompaniment by **Aviva Plaut** (recorder), **Yehudah Plaut** (guitar) and **Joel Gimpel** (violin), **Rabbi Marc Labowitz** performed many beautiful, original song arrangements with his musical family as well as providing a stellar High Holy Day sermon."

Simchat Torah

KBS had planned to celebrate Simchat Torah at the Imin Center in Holualoa, but at the last minute, COVID restrictions caused us to cancel the in-person event and we returned to an online observance via Zoom. Instead of traditional *Hakafot* with singing, dancing and food, the Torah was walked once around the *bima* (the Plaut's dining room table) for each *Hakafah* followed by a five-minute *D'var Torah* given by members for each *hakafah*.

Shabbat Monthly Services

We finally were able to resume a small gathering at Hawaiian Queen Coffee Garden (HQCG) on October 23, 2021, when we conducted a hybrid Zoom/limited in-person Shabbat service. County rules still restricted indoor events to 10 people but it felt so good to be back there again and we even had a minyan! Shari Berman led the service from her home in Japan. Aviva and Vic read the Torah. Several Board members attended and Leah Hillert, soon to have her own Bat Mitzvah, attended with her mom, Alysa Freeman and brother, Franz. Everyone attending in person was fully vaccinated. Seating was set up to allow wide spacing.

On **Thanksgiving Saturday, November 27**, we held another hybrid service. **Aviva Plaut** led with **Vic, Aviva** and **Shari** reading from Torah *parasha* Vayechi. **Barry Blum** celebrated his birthday by delivering the *drash*. We still limited attendance to 10 persons at Hawaiian Queen but **Alan Silverman** broadcast the service to the entire planet via Zoom. Although there was no food after the service, we did have a quick Kiddush.

On **December 18, 2021**, KBS held another "hybrid" service at Hawaii Queen Coffee Garden. Jewish religious life was slowly but surely returning to normal!

Chanukah

Vivienne Aronowitz led the way for us helping to host our combined KBS/NHC Annual Chanukah Celebration up north at the Mauna Kea Beach Resort. A select portion of Kona's Traveling Jewish Wedding Band including Barry & Gloria Blum, Joel Gimpel (violin), Leslie Harlib (keyboard), and newcomer to the Band Bill Lamden (clarinet), with Alan Silverman doing the sound engineering, played the traditional Chanukah songs for all to sing as part of our celebration.

January 1, 2022, a Happy New Year Bar Mitzvah

That Saturday, besides being the first day of 2022, was a special occasion, the *minchah* **Bar Mitzvah** of **Samuel Nicholas Davidorf**, son of **Robert & Suzanne Davidorf** of San Francisco, CA. **Shari Berman** officiated (in-person), and noted that Sam was one of the most active and socially minded 12-year-olds she had ever come across. **Vic Greenspan**, **Aviva & Yehudah Plaut**, and **Alan & Nella Silverman** set up **Hawaiian Queen Coffee Garden** to be a safe space during the height of the Delta Variant threat and the service was broadcast via Zoom. Sam's parents gave an "Our Bar Mitzvah Boy is Great" speech that may be Guinness-Record worthy.

Bat Mitzvah of Leah Hillert

For the first time in many years, KBS celebrated a **Bat Mitzvah** of one of our own children in **February 2022**: **Leah**, daughter of **Alysa Freeman & Gunnar Hillert**, whose family members traveled all the way from Germany to join in the *simcha*. As usual, it was a joint effort of the whole *kehillah*. **Trina** taught Leah Hebrew, along with parts of the service and the prayers. **Aviva** taught Leah her Torah portion. **Rabbi Daniel Lev** met regularly with Leah for Jewish education and helped her with her *drash*. **Yehudah** played the music during the service. **Alan Silverman** was the tech wizard. **Nella Silverman** kept everyone sane and organized (!). **Alysa Freeman**, amazing mother that she is, was the behind-thescenes planner. Many others helped as well. Two big tents were erected outside to meet all health protocols. It was a wonderful effort by all and everyone was proud of Leah's accomplishment as she joined the ranks of the community.

Goldie Lefkowitz joined KBS soon after moving to the Big Island. Goldie is a Holocaust survivor and is an author and world-wide lecturer on that subject. In honor of her 100th birthday on April 12, 2022, Hawaii County Mayor Mitch Roth proclaimed that day as "Goldie Lefkowitz Day." The mayor and several KBSers as well as Goldie's family attended her birthday party in Kailua-Kona.

On June 4, 2022, we celebrated Shavuot and Shabbat at HQCG including the first pot-luck since the pandemic began, with blintzes, bagels and more.

Services since then have continued to be a hybrid mix with some attending in person and some on Zoom, participating on the large screen monitor set up in the room. Aviva Plaut, Barry Blum, Trina Yerlick, Shari Berman and Vic Greenspan have led the services this past year. Aviva, Vic, Shari and Trina are our Torah readers. Our KBS Jewish community has continued on without faltering, remaining flexible and mindful of both restrictions and common sense.

For this coming year we look forward to continuing our monthly hybrid Shabbat gatherings at HQCG (4th Saturday of each month) and our weekly online gatherings for **Friday evening** candle-lighting and **Saturday morning Torah Study**. 

NITZAVIM

Kona Beth Shalom, along with all of our state's Jewish congregations, has continued participation with the Nitzavim program offered by the Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation to build community, interpreted to mean "standing ready to act according to the commandments."

At the recent Nitzavim Conference led by Josh Levinson, the framework that we worked with was based on the teachings of Marshall Ganz through his 42-page document called *Leading Change*; *Leadership*, Organization, and Social Movements. What we have been practicing for months is this concept of telling:

- 1. The Story of Self
- 2. The Story of Us
- 3. The Story of Now

This is a persuasive format for making social change. We were shown many examples; most recently we studied the Montgomery Bus Boycott. We broke up into 4 or 5 groups, each facilitated by a leader/consultant, all from the mainland. Each group had a certain purpose. The larger group as a whole never got to work on a statewide effort to enact social change. We are not finished though, so we may find ourselves as a statewide group working on a campaign for helping to solve the hunger/food insecurity problem in our state. In late 2022 or early 2023, the larger group is planning to make trips to each island to experience the different communities/congregations first hand.
